Indonesia volcano erupts, disrupts normal life

The continued eruptions of Mount Lewotobi Laki-Laki in Indonesia's East Nusa Tenggara province have forced residents to evacuate and caused widespread flight cancellations, officials and airport authorities confirmed.

According to the Volcanology and Geological Disaster Mitigation Centre, the volcano remained active on Wednesday, spewing ash across several villages situated on its slopes.

While Tuesday's eruption sent a massive ash column soaring up to 10 kms into the sky, triggering a red aviation alert, the highest level, Wednesday's eruption was less intense, with the ash plume rising approximately 1 km. The powerful eruption on Tuesday prompted a wave of evacuations.

Gaspar Losa Manisa, head of the emergency



unit at the provincial Disaster Management and Mitigation Agency, told *Xinhua* that many residents had already taken shelter prior to the eruption.

Others, who had earlier returned to their homes in the danger zone on their own initiative, were forced to evacuate again.

"Due to the volcanic ash being carried by strong winds, residents in two additional villages were asked to evacuate to shelters," said Gaspar, adding that no casualties or damage to homes and

infrastructure have been reported so far.

Authorities are also addressing health concerns associated with volcanic ash, which can cause respiratory issues.

"We have distributed masks and nose-mouth covers in affected areas, but we still need between 50,000 to 100,000 more," he added. The ash clouds have also disrupted air travel. I Gusti Ngurah Rai International Airport in Bali reported the cancellation of several international flights due to the eruption.

Cancelled routes include flights from Australia, Vietnam, Singapore, and Malaysia.

Despite the disruptions, Acting General Manager of the Bali airport Wahyudi noted that the airport remains operational. "Our teams have been on alert and coordinating since receiving information about the eruption on Tuesday afternoon," he said.

Helpdesks have been set up in both international and domestic terminals to assist passengers with flight status updates, refunds, rescheduling, and rerouting arrangements, according to him.

Elsewhere, three airports on Flores Island, Frans Seda Maumere Airport, H. Hasan Aroeboesman Ende Airport, and Soa Bajawa Airport, were closed on Wednesday due to volcanic ash detected on the runways.

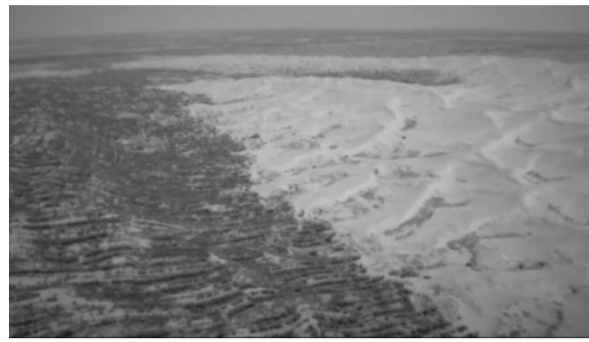
China successfully combats desertification

China has made substantial strides in combating desertification, with 365 million mu (about 24.3 million hectares) of desertified areas turned into green land since 2012, data from the National Forestry and Grassland Administration showed Tuesday.

About 27.94 million mu of land has been put under protection against desertification over the past 13 years, said the administration on the World Day to Combat Desertification and Drought, which falls on June 17 each year.

Official data also showed that from 2000 to 2019, the total amount of wind-eroded soil in the country's major deserts and sandy land has declined by about 40%, and China is the first nation to achieve zero growth in land degradation.

Under China's Three-



North Shelterbelt Forest Program (TSFP), the world's largest afforestation program launched in 1978 to tackle desertification in northwestern, northern and northeastern parts of the country.

As a result, a total of 480 million mu of forests have been planted and preserved, and 1.28 billion mu of degraded grasslands have been restored. In regions covered by the TSFP, the forest coverage ratio has risen from 5.05 percent in 1977 to 13.84% today, with 61% of soil erosion areas effectively

controlled and 450 million mu of farmland protected.

China is also actively fulfilling its commitments under the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD).

The country has established an international desertification control knowledge management center in collaboration with the UNCCD secretariat, and is joining efforts with a number of countries in desertification control, including Mongolia and Russia, said the administration.

Earth's cloud cover shrinking at rapid pace: Study

Earth's cloud cover is shrinking at a rapid pace, intensifying global warming and contributing to record-breaking temperatures worldwide, an international study involving Australian researchers has revealed.

The study, based on 24 years of satellite data, found that 1.5 to 3 percent of the world's storm cloud zones have shrunk each decade, a trend driven by climate change as shifting winds and expanding tropics push storm systems toward the poles, said a latest news release on the website of the Australian Research Council (ARC) Centre of Excellence for 21st Century Weather at Monash University in Melbourne.

With fewer clouds to reflect sunlight back into space, more solar energy is absorbed by the Earth, amplifying the warming effect of greenhouse gas emissions, according to the study led by the United States National Aeronautics and Space Administration in collaboration with Australian researchers and published in *Geophysical Research Letters*. This reduction in cloud cover is now seen as the main reason Earth is absorbing more solar energy, with new research confirming these changes are already driving significant recent warming, said Christian Jakob, the study's co-author and director of the ARC Center.

"It's an important piece in the puzzle of understanding the extraordinary recent warming we observed, and a wake-up call for urgent climate action," Jakob said, adding accurately predicting cloud formation and sunlight reflection is essential for anticipating the speed and scale of future warming. "It's not just long-term averages that matter, but how the day-to-day and season-to-season conditions we all rely on are changing," he said.

Vietnam joins BRICS as partner country

Vietnam has officially joined BRICS as a partner country, according to a statement from Brazil's Ministry of Foreign Affairs - the BRICS chair for 2025.

After expressing its desire to becoming a member of the powerful global body for some time, Vietnam has now become the 10th BRICS partner, aligning itself with the bloc's vision of a more inclusive and representative order, reports Sputnik.

"With a population of nearly 100 million and a dynamic economy deeply integrated into global value chains, Vietnam is an important player in Asia," the ministry's statement said.

Vietnam in recent years has become one of the fastest growing economies in the world and one of the strongest in South East Asia, having become one of the major destinations alongside India, Indonesia, Mexico, Thailand, and Malaysia, for investors looking to

shift manufacturing from China.

The partner country category was created at the 2024 BRICS Summit in Kazan, Russia. The current list of partners include: Vietnam, Belarus, Bolivia, Kazakhstan, Cuba, Malaysia, Nigeria, Thailand, Uganda, Uzbekistan.

While partner nations are not members of the bloc, it offers the option of more flexible association, as partner nations can collaborate with BRICS nations in

meetings, and engage in proposed development projects.

The status also opens the door to closer ties with the bloc's institutions, including the New Development Bank, which offers infrastructure financing to developing economies.

Hanoi has yet to release a formal statement on the admission, which follows a period of deeper engagement between the Southeast Asian country and BRICS, as per South China Morning Post.

Vietnamese Prime Minister Pham Minh Chinh attended the expanded BRICS+ summit in Kazan in October 2024, and Vietnamese delegations have taken part in related dialogues, including a June 2024 meeting in Nizhny Novgorod, Russia, focused on cooperation with developing countries.

The bloc, which was formed by the world's five biggest leading economies - Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa - has emerged as a major alternative to West dominated blocs such as the G7, and promote de-dollarisation of global economy for other viable options and reduce Western hegemony.

Miffed over China ties, New Zealand halts Cook Islands funding

New Zealand has frozen millions of dollars in funding to the Cook Islands following concerns over a series of agreements the small Pacific nation recently signed with China. Officials from the office of New Zealand's Foreign Minister Winston Peters confirmed the decision on Thursday, citing worries about the "breadth and content" of the deals and a lack of prior consultation.



In February, Beijing defended its partnership with the Cook Islands, insisting the agreements were not intended to strain ties with New Zealand.

The suspended funds were allocated for "core sector support" in health, education, and tourism - key areas for the 15,000-strong island nation. A Cook Islands parliamentary committee report this week voiced concern over a shortfall of NZD 10 million (USD 6 million) in the government's finances.

The funding comes from a broader NZD 200 million package provided over the past three years under a six-decade-old compact that requires the Cook Islands to consult Wellington on any foreign agreements that might impact New Zealand's interests.

The deals with China are now being seen as the first major test of that agreement.

While the agreements with China do not include direct security cooperation, they promise significant Chinese investment in infrastructure and scholarships. Some documents have yet to be made public, increasing unease in Wellington -

particularly given Cook Islanders' rights to live and work in New Zealand.

"There was a lack of transparency and consultation," said Peters' spokesperson. "Until the Cook Islands Government takes clear steps to rebuild trust, New Zealand will not approve any major new funding."

Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown has defended the China agreements, saying they are meant to complement - not replace - traditional ties with New Zealand, Australia, and others. In February, he stated that the goal was to maintain a "diversified portfolio of partnerships."

Nevertheless, the move triggered street protests in the capital, Avarua, led by opposition leaders concerned about national sovereignty and foreign influence.

Mihai Sora, a Pacific analyst at the Lowy Institute in Australia, said New Zealand's reaction was foreseeable. "This is a direct result of Cook Islands' strategic flirtation with China. It's unrealistic to think Beijing's involvement has no geopolitical motive, especially given its broader actions in the region," he said.



Panama flays US for dragging name in China issue

Panama President Jose Raul Mulino has asked the United States to not drag his country into its tensions with China, emphasizing the importance of maintaining neutrality and focussing on domestic priorities while navigating international relations.

The remarks come post an announcement by the US Embassy in Panama City regarding its plan to swap out communication tower equipment manufactured by the Chinese firm Huawei with what they claimed was more secure US technology, reports Al Mayadeen.

During his weekly news conference, Mulino cautioned the US diplomatic mission against attempting to involve Panama in the geopolitical tensions

between Beijing and Washington.

"Let them fight their problem in Washington or Beijing, but not in Panama's backyard," Mulino said in the press conference.

Trump has also stated that the US should reclaim control of the Panama Canal, which he claimed was being operated by China and used to overcharge US shipments to Panama.

However, Mulino and his administration have completely denied the allegations, slamming Trump over his remarks and asserting that the Canal falls under Panama's sovereign territory. Trump's remarks have caused significant strain in US-Panama ties.

Panama Minister Frank Abrego said the

telecommunications project at the centre of the latest spat had been in development for almost a decade.

Panama installed several communication towers in 2017 in the eastern province of Darien using its own funds.

The United States later offered to fund the \$8 million project but asked to modify it because the equipment did not meet its military security requirements, Abrego said.

International Day Against Unilateral Coercive Measures

The General Assembly recently adopted a resolution to proclaim Dec 4 every year as the International Day Against Unilateral Coercive Measures.

The resolution urges states to refrain from adopting, promulgating and applying any unilateral economic, financial or trade measures not in accordance with international law and the UN Charter that impede or undermine the full achievement of economic and social development, particularly in developing countries.

It expresses the conviction that the establishment of the International Day will complement ongoing efforts aimed at raising global awareness of the adverse effects of unilateral coercive measures and promote

greater international cooperation and solidarity among nations in addressing the consequences of such measures.

The resolution was adopted with 116 votes in favor, 51 against, and 6 abstentions. Global North countries, including EU states and Australia, Britain, Canada, Japan, the United States, voted against it.

The resolution requests the UN Secretary-General to take the necessary measures and arrangements for the United Nations to commemorate and promote the International Day, including as part of global efforts to raise awareness about the negative impact of unilateral coercive measures not in accordance with international law and the

UN Charter.

The resolution invites all UN member states and observers, organisations of the UN system and other international and regional organisations, as well as civil society, individuals and other relevant stakeholders to observe the International Day and to raise awareness of the negative impacts of unilateral coercive measures not in accordance with international law and the UN Charter, particularly for developing countries.

It requests the president of the General Assembly to organise, on an annual basis and starting from 2025, an informal plenary meeting of the assembly to commemorate and promote the International Day.
